





I got up and by the faint light of the early morning scrawled them on a piece of paper and then went back to bed and sound asleep again. That is the way the hymn was written."



#### Mrs. Maud Howe Elliott Is Given Back Citizenship

(Associated Press Dispatch.)

Newport, R. I., June 4.—Mrs. Maud Howe Elliott, daughter of Julia Ward Howe, author of the "Battle Hymn of the Republic," is once more an American citizen. She was naturalized today in the Superior court, having applied under the act of Congress passed recently permitting American-born women who had married foreign subjects to regain citizenship.

Mrs. Elliott married John Elliott, a British subject, in Rome about 25 years ago, but despite her loss of citizenship, she had always been at heart a true American. She is living with her husband here.

The field commander of the Hessians, Captain Malsburg, later wrote in his journal, recalling that his men, "...now rushed up the hill under heavy fire in order to take the redoubt. Here they experienced a more obstinate resistance than they expected. They found large bodies of troops behind the works and at its sides, chiefly wild looking men in their shirt sleeves, and among them many Negroes."







### 5 Founder's Brook 5A Town Pond







## 6. Stone Bridge





There are espaliers of fruit trees at each end of the garden, some curious flowering shrubs, and a pretty collection of fruit trees. The room on the left in the summer-house, is beautifully prepared and designed for music, contains a spinnet (piano). But the whole garden discovered the desolations of war and the want of a gardener to dress it. The Marquis de la Fayette took quarters at this house. A number of cannon fired from the enemy's lines this afternoon, but no damage done.








MISSY OF THE GLEN.




During a 1997 visit to the Glen, Moses
